Remainder of Powderhorn Ranch Donated to TPWD

The entirety of Powderhorn Ranch is now in the hands of the people of Texas. In a land transaction that closed Oct. 27, Texas Parks and Wildlife Foundation (TPWF) donated the final 1.360 acres to the Texas Parks ty and Wildlife Department (TPWD). In 2018, TPWF donated 14,998 acres of the property to TPWD for Powderhorn Wildlife Management Area (WMA). The remainder of the property that transferred recently will one day become a state park.

"The donation of Powderhorn Ranch is a promise kept," said Mike Greene, Chairman of the TPWF Board of Trustees. "This historic investment was made possible by an exceptional public-

private partnership and exemplifies how landscape-scale conservation can be achieved in Texas and beyond."

The acquisition of the 17,351-acre Powderhorn Ranch in Calhoun County forever conserves a spectacular piece of property that is one of the largest remaining tracts of unspoiled coastal prairie in the state. The purchase was made possible by a coalition of conservation partners and donors led by TPWF.

"This transformational project conserves irreplaceable wildlife habitat and brings an exciting new recreational opportunity to the people of Texas," said Dan Friedkin, Chairman Emeritus of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission. "It

demonstrates how Texas's community of conservationists can work hand-in-hand with the state to preserve an extraordinary piece of our natural heritage for generations to come." Friedkin served as chairman of TPWF's \$100 million "Keeping it Wild: The Campaign for Texas," which included funding for Powderhorn. Friedkin made the lead gift for the campaign, which was the largest individual gift in TPWD's history.

Conservation organizations and TPWD have had their eye on Powderhorn for many years. In 2014, significant funding became available from the National Fish and Wildlife Foun-



"Lake Fork Water Temps On Par!"

"Cold temps are right around the corner and the "not so fun" winter season is upon us. As with the fall of 2020, Fork is on par with last years fall water temps which are hovering in the low 60's and way ahead of years past. You might consider it a mild fall and let's hope it doesn't turn into the winter of last year. This lake doesn't need thick sheets of ice again and I'm leery on how these Florida bass adjust to that type of curve ball. Time will tell. Meanwhile, adjusting to the current conditions is what we will talk about today. The key is what the baitfish are doing and, as with last fall, things seem to be a little late. Barfish normally show up on points,

humps and roadbeds as of this writing and I can only report that there are only small amounts visible especially in the afternoon. The fishing has been reasonably poor so I might wonder if the lake is still turning over even at this late date.

More than a month ago shad were starting to migrate to the backs of the creeks where hungry bass were stocking up for the cold days ahead. Most disappeared in early November. The years lack of rain has the lake over two and a half feet low and this may have something to do with it compared to past seasons. The change in water temps should have helped the shallow bite and, oddly enough, these same cooler water temps haven't allowed the big bass to gang up deep as of this writing. This changes our focus to mid depth water patterns and this will continue into December while we are searching for the next ShareLunker. Provided the water continues to slowly cool heading into Santa month, good electronics will play a key roll in the search of these groups of monster green fish and the best place to start your search will be at the mouth of the major creeks, Birch, Penson, Mustang, Williams, Wolfe and Dale. Focus on the shad and scan for hooks that are surrounding the clouds of bait. All these bass will be suspended so target these fish with a flutter spoon if the wind is an issue or a weightless fluke if the water is calm. Count



the bait down to the level where you marked them at the rate of a second per foot. At that point, twitch the fluke or rip the spoon. Stay in touch with the shad and see what happens. Any flutter spoon will do the trick if you are in the mouth of a creek that is inundated with timber. Let it flutter to the bottom and experiment with different retrieves to isolate what the fish favor. A standard spoon in the same silver or gold works better if you are in open water with no obstructions. Pay close attention to your graph and direct your efforts in areas where there are schools of sand bass or bar fish. All year, the big black bass have been mixed in with the schools feeding on the unwitting small bar fish. C-rigs

dation's Gulf Environmental Benefit Fund, which resulted from the Deepwater Horizon oil spill, and TPWF committed to raise \$15 million to complete funding for the project. In addition to the \$37.7 million purchase price, TPWF raised funds for initial habitat restoration and an endowment to fund longterm maintenance, which brought the total project cost to nearly \$50 million. The Conservation Fund and The Nature Conservancy provided interim financing, and The Nature Conservancy holds a conservation easement that will forever protect the property. With numerous partners

and donors coming to the table, the decades-long goal of conserving Powderhorn Ranch became a reality.

"Powderhorn Ranch conserves pristine wildlife habitat in an area of Texas that is facing increasing development pressure," said TPWD Executive Director Carter Smith. "The investment in this property forever protects a remarkable diversity of species and habitat and connects a patchwork of protected lands from the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge to Mad Island Wildlife Management Area and the recently expanded Matagorda Peninsula Coastal Man-

agement Area that are vital to the resilience of a healthy Gulf Coast ecosystem."

Powderhorn Ranch conserves in perpetuity unspoiled coastal land with forests of coastal live oak and intact wetlands. The property also includes thousands of acres of freshwater wetlands and salt marshes that offer vital fish and wildlife habitat, provide natural filtering to improve water quality and shield people and property from storm surges and sea level rise. Powderhorn Ranch encompasses more than 11 miles of tidal bayfront on Matagorda Bay, which is home to hundreds of species of birds and animals,

including the endangered historic camp house on whooping crane. The property, including since the 2014 acquisition, TPWF has steward-ed the property to prepare collection system. In the

ed the property to prepare for the donation to the state. Thousands of acres of running live oak have been cleared, revitalizing Powderhorn's native prairie. Three new solar wells were installed, providing permanent water sources for terrestrial wildlife, wading birds and waterfowl and creating the transitional wetlands necessary for a complete coastal ecosystem. In addition, TPWF constructed buildings now being used by WMA staff, built miles of fence, and also oversaw the restoration of the

historic camp house on the property, including replacing an aging cistern with a new rainwater collection system. In the future, the camp house will become a state park interpretive center, with the rainwater collection system serving as a demonstration of sustainable water management and conservation practices.

Before the property was transferred, TPWF worked with numerous partners to facilitate access for recreational opportunities such as birding, hunting, camping, and fishing. Since 2019, Powderhorn WMA has provided scheduled access for conservation education, research, birding, and public hunting. While there is no timeline yet for development of the state park, it typically takes many years for a master plan to be developed and for state funding to be identified for park development.



"The Moon Report" "Fork's Winter Transition"

Well – as much as I hate to say it – the cold weather has finally arrived! These 30 some degree mornings will sure remind you how old your getting! But, the motivation of knowing how good the fishing gets when the temperature falls and the crappie start their winter feeding frenzy – it's enough to make you power through the cold! The surface temperature

has dropped into the 50's so the crappie are making a big push out deeper. We are targeting 24 to 40 ft. depths – but, how deep they might be in those depths can change daily and throughout the day. They might be 12 ft. down or 25 ft. down. Just keep a close eye on the graph and target accordingly. Also make note of how deep the baitfish are running. If your fishing with Livescope, you will know exactly how deep to fish and in what direction! All vou have to do is figure out what size and color jig they want that day. But, fair warning - you have to be able to take "rejection" with the Livescope because some days they are just not interested and just turn and swim away! Try your best to keep your bait above them and don't spook them by crashing down through them or erratically hopping your bait. This will definitely make them scatter. Try to hold your bait as steady as possible and maybe a light twitch now and then. If you see a fish headed for you, just slowly lift away



from it and generally that will trigger a strike!

Not all the crappie are deep – especially around a new or full moon. The last full moon when everyone was catching them in 30 to 40 ft., I found some nice ones in 10 to 15 ft. (I was very grateful because there was 4 ft. rollers out on the main lake!) Oh my gosh, the winds have been brutal! So, if you see a forecast of 5-10 or light and variable, take advantage of it - they have become rare!

Check your main lake points, creek channels, timber lines, brush piles and bridges. I am seeing giant shad in their stomachs so you might want to up-size your bait – like a Bonehead 3 inch bait with a ¹/₄ oz. Bonehead jig head. Or you can tip a minnow on a Skipper ¹/₄ jig. The colors producing have been black/chartreuse, LSU, white/chartreuse and blue/white.

Before I forget–December 1st to March 1st you have to keep the first 25 you catch – no culling. The 10 inch minimum does not go back in effect till March 1st.

It's hard to believe this year is coming to an end. It's been another year of great challenges and heartbreaking losses for everyone. But, so grateful for all the blessings that came through during these tough times!

Heartfelt thanks to all that came to fish with me this year and especially those that have fished with me my whole career! (They were as happy as I was when the Skeeter Solera boat came along!) – they call it my "Luxury Liner"! So, a "BIG" thank you to Skeeter Boats for making my customers so comfortable on our fishing trips!

Also, be sure and check out Lake Fork Marina for your holiday shopping for all of the fishermen in your life. They have some great gift ideas and gift baskets!



November is known as a time to give thanks, but conditions for trout fishing. in Texas the month also marks the beginning of a winter tradition for anglers of all ages across the state. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department kicked off this tradition when it began stocking thousands of rainbow trout Nov. 24. The easy to catch rainbow trout are delicious table fare and can be found on many restaurant menus.

"TPWD stocks catchable sized fish during winter months to create angling opportunities throughout Texas," said TPWD's rainbow trout Program Director, Carl Kittel. Rainbow trout love cold water, can be caught on a variety of baits and lures (worms, commercially available pastes, corn, spinners, spoons, flies and more), and are great to take home and eat. Our winter rainbow trout program has been a favorite with anglers for over forty years."

TPWD plans to stock a total of 352,563 rainbow trout in Texas from Nov. 24 through Mar. 6, 2022. Because rainbow trout are unable to survive in Texas after the winter, anglers are encouraged to keep up to their daily bag limit of five trout. Rainbow trout are an attractive, tasty fish and anglers can easily find recipes to prepare these fish online. The Neighborhood Fishin' program offers some outstanding opportunities to catch rainbow trout for families and new anglers in and around major

cities. TPWD manages 18 Neighborhood Fishin' lakes statewide in most major urban centers, including Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio. These lakes are frequently stocked with rainbow trout during the winter stocking season and offer plenty of amenities so that family members of all ages can enjoy a fun and relaxing day fishing and connecting in nature.

Tailrace fishing is popular during trout season and for anglers interested in going that route, TPWD will stock rainbow trout into the Canyon Tailrace on the Guadalupe River below Canyon Lake, and the Possum Kingdom Tailrace on the Brazos River below Possum Kingdom Lake. Those locations often have very cool water and provide excellent

Other stocking locations include dozens of local city and county managed park ponds, the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center casting pond, and several rivers including the Frio, South Llano and Guadalupe rivers and the Clear Fork of the Trinity River.

In addition, anglers can pursue a fish in a Texas State Park for free without a fishing license. Anyone planning a trip to a Texas State Park should keep in mind that reserving a day pass in advance is highly recommended. Day passes can be reserved online though the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department website or over the phone by calling (512) 389-8900.

The good news is it doesn't take a lot of sophisticated fishing equipment to reel in a rainbow trout. They can be caught using simple, light tackle or on hand-tied flies using a fly rod. However, keeping an array of baits and lures nearby while having ice available when harvesting trout to keep them fresh are good points to keep in mind before heading out to the water. For more tips on how to catch rainbow trout, gain some insight from TPWD staff on the TPWD YouTube channel.

In Texas, children under 17 fish for free, but a

fishing license with a freshwater fishing endorsement is required for adults in the family. An angler fishing in a Community Fishing Lake or from a dock, pier or jetty within a Texas State Park may use no more than two poles. The statewide bag limit is five trout, except on parts of the Guadalupe River where special limits are in effect.

The dates and locations are subject to change due to inclement weather or other unforeseen circumstances. Be sure to check the 2021-22 Trout Stocking Schedule online before you go fishing to confirm the stocking date, check fishing regulations and to find other winter trout stocking program angling tips.





water or other contaminated materials. These factors make disease control efforts extremely challenging.

As deer, waterfowl and quail hunting seasons are in full swing, TPWD asks that hunters report any rabbit mortality events, especially in areas of the Panhandle and Trans Pecos regions where previously positive cases were confirmed by both the USDA and TAHC.

To date, counties with known mortality events include the following: Brewster, Cottle, Culberson, El Paso, Gaines, Hale, Hockley, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Lubbock, Pecos, Potter, Presidio, Randall and Ward counties. Reports of dead rabbits should be made to a local biolo-

gist in the county in which they were found.

(lagomorphs). It is not known to affect humans, livestock or pets other than rabbits. However, pets, such as hunting dogs, should not be allowed to consume dead animal carcasses. Often the only clinical sign is sudden death. In less acute cases, clinical signs in rabbits have included the following: dullness/apathy, not eating, bleeding from the nose and eyes or watery, congested eyes. Some may also exhibit neurological signs such as incoordination, excitement or seizure-like episodes.

TPWD advises all rabbit hunters voluntarily clean rabbits in the harvest location and dis-

card non-consumed carcass parts in the same RHDV appears only to affect rabbit species area. Hunters can also minimize the spread of this disease by reducing the movement of biological materials and carcasses across Texas. Hunters are advised to take standard protective measures such as wearing gloves and thoroughly washing their hands after field dressing rabbits. TPWD also requests that hunters thoroughly clean coolers containing rabbits with a 10% bleach solution after use.

"Knowing What To Look For!"

By Michael McFarland

First off I want to wish you and your family happy holidays and a very Merry Christmas. I really love the month of December for many reasons, many of which you would commonly expect.

Time off from work, catching up on much needed rest, celebrating Christmas with family and friends, etc..

However from an outdoorsman/fishing guides perspective there is something else that comes to Lake Fork during the month of December or should I say migrates to and arrives here at Lake Fork during the month of December. It is one of

the most majestic and absolutely amazing under water diving birds called the Loon.

The Loon bird can hold its breath for up to twelve minutes and dive reaching depths of more than 60 meters (thats 180 feet).

But why and how would the loon be a benefit to us big bass fisherman you ask?

Well here you go!

First off the Loon is a large bird and generally prefers to search for larger profile baitfish like gizzard shad and or large adult threadfin shad on a daily basis. This makes the diving loon a great tool in finding daily schools of larger sized baitfish. Uniquely enough the larger profile baitfish

This is awesome, however the loon is a migrating bird and only spends about 3 to 4 months here at Lake Fork.The loon will tend to first arrive around the end of November first of December and will be gone by May. With that being said, yes, the return of the Loon is the other reason I love the

month of December. Ok so now again from my fisherman's perspective here are some important tips on how I use the Loon to find the giant bass. The first thing I do each day is find a diving loon and or group of loons and begin by observing the birds behavior. I pay close attention to and study the under water depths, contours and structure the birds are diving into. I prefer to locate a single diving loon because I believe that a single diving bird will potentially work off of a school of bass. In other words using the bass to help them ambush. A large group of diving loons acts as a school of its own thus not needing the aid of the schooling bass.

Here are 3 tips & important behaviors to recognize when your watching the Loon.

1- The Loon is diving, searching at a brisk pace and does not stay in one area for very long (I call this hunting) if you see this you should keep moving and searching yourself.



Harrell says due to the La Niña weather pattern forecast for this winter, the Southwest is in for a drier, warmer season.



and drop shots have worked well also using redbug and iunebug Talon Carolina Worms. Locate the baitfish and go to work.

Once the water cools into the low 50's the shallow bite will still be relevant on sunny days providing the water temps are warming. Rattletraps, squarebills, chatterbaits and spinnerbaits will all answer the call to duty. Look for vegetation in the skinny water and pay attention to any baitfish activity. There will also be other patterns that will work during this time of the year, one being the jig and craw trailer fished on the creek bends where wood is present. Black and blue is my fav, especially

on cloudy days. If the water is fairly clear, switch to watermelon red front to back. Work it slow, especially through the roots of the trees. Sunny afternoons during this season can also be a gold mine. As the water cools into the mid-fifties, chatterbaits and traps are the go to baits worked shallow and be sure to focus on the 2:00 to 5:30pm window. Water warms during the afternoon and the fish will move up for a free meal. Pay attention to any bird activity and they will lead you to the bass.

December/January is also a great month to catch numbers on the power plant lakes. If cabin fever has set in, give me a call and we can wear them out where the water temps are summer like. If you are headed out to Lake Fork in December searching for the trophy of a lifetime, I would love to be a part of this trophy quest. I still have a few dates open in December and some in January. 

Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

--Sting Operation--In August, a concerned citizen contacted Montgomery County game wardens regarding a neighbor keeping an alligator in his back yard. The wardens responded to the home where the alligator was reportedly kept. The homeowner admitted to capturing an alligator 4 or 5 feet in length from Lake Conroe, transporting it home to show his kids and then releasing it the next day. The

wardens inspected the property and noticed a room full of aquariums. Knowledgeable in aquatic species, one of the wardens identified the animals as freshwater stingrays, which are an invasive species and illegal to possess. Through further conversation, the homeowner also admitted to removing a small alligator snapping turtle from Lake Livingston and keeping it in a tank. As the largest freshwater turtle in North America and a threatened species, it is illegal to capture or possess one without a permit. After discussing the

matter with the homeowner, he agreed to assist game wardens in relocating the animals to better suited facilities. The turtle was donated to the Spring Creek Nature Center, which is permitted to possess native species and display them for educational purposes. The stingrays were transported to Moody Gardens to educate the public about different ecosystems and the harm that invasive species can cause to local wildlife.

a "Be on the Lookout" bulletin to assist in the identification of an individual and vehicle last seen leaving a crime scene in the San Elizario area. An El Paso/Hudspeth County game warden remembered the vehicle from a recent encounter with fishermen which resulted in the arrest of the individual. The warden contacted the lead investigator and passed along the identifying information. Several days later, El Paso County Sheriff's detectives notified the warden that without firm leads in the case, the information he shared with their office was vital in locating the subject and the vehicle. Due to his inter-agency collaboration, an arrest was carried out.

--Hold the Pepper--In September, a Bexar County game warden received a call from Austin communications about dove hunters peppering local residences with shotgun pellets. Upon arrival to the field, the warden observed two gentlemen hunting. As he drove up to the individuals, one of the gentlemen stood up and shot a bird that fell a few yards from him. The warden proceeded to complete a hunting check. He spoke with the individual and asked if he was aware of the type of bird he had just shot. The hunter did not know. The warden informed him that the bird was an American kestrel, a protected bird of prey, and is not allowed to be hunted or harvested. The warden checked the other hunters in the group and

discussed the issues around peppering, ensuring their shotgun pellets did not cross property lines. A citation was issued for harvesting a protected species. The case and civil restitution are pending.

--Off the Road Again-- An Amarillo district game warden was patrolling in Potter County after dark when he was notified about an injured individual who had been "run over" by an allterrain vehicle. The warden responded immediately. He found one adult male hit by an ATV and suffering non-life-threatening injuries to his legs. The victim and other evewitnesses at the scene identified another adult male as the driver of the ATV. Upon speaking with the driver of the ATV, the warden noticed that he had heavily slurred speech patterns, glassy/bloodshot eyes, and the odor of alcohol emitting from his breath. The victim of the collision was transported to an Amarillo hospital. The driver of the ATV admitted hitting the victim with the ATV and was sub-

sequently arrested for driving while intoxicated and deadly conduct. The driver was booked into the Potter County Jail without incident.

--Caught on Camera-- In September, a Tyler County game warden received information on individuals potentially participating in road hunting. The warden worked with a landowner setting up surveillance cameras in their field. Not long after he set up the monitoring system, he observed a slow-moving vehicle spotlighting and headed towards his location. The warden initiated a traffic stop, determining the subjects were hunting at night. Inside the vehicle, the warden located a loaded .22 long rifle. Additionally, the subject was a minor operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol. Charges are pending.

--How Trashy-- In Nov., a Lubbock district game warden received a call about several illegally dumped sandhill cranes in a community dumpster. The Lubbock police department officer on



scene climbed into the dumpster to confirm that the birds were not breasted out and the warden responded to collect evidence and begin interviewing possible suspects and neighbors. The dumpster was next to a Texas Tech University fraternity and a large apartment complex. After interviewing multiple individuals, the suspect was discovered and admitted that he and his friend left the cranes in the back of his truck the day prior and thought that the temperature was too warm to keep the meat. Waste of game charges were filed on both individuals.

--Two Hearts That Beat as One--Anderson County game wardens were patrolling near Highway 155 for deer hunters. While traveling, the wardens noticed a freshly caped whitetail deer hide stretched and tacked on a 4x8 sheet of plywood and a gentleman observing it. After turning around to make an inspection, the gentleman and his wife both noticed the game wardens making an effort to approach their residence and left the scene. After further inspection, two undersized buck heads were found along with the deer hide. Time elapsed and after a brief wait, the female suspect returned to the scene. The wardens questioned her about the deer and the location of her husband. She stated that she dropped her husband off at work. After further investigation

the husband was located at the local Walmart and later returned to the scene. The husband admitted to killing a doe and said that his wife killed an illegal buck a few weeks prior. As for the other whitetail buck, the couple removed its head from the median of Highway 155. Multiple citations were issued including hunting under the license of another, allowing another to hunt under his/ her license, and no hunting license. The case is still under investigation and pending.

--See You Later--In Nov., a Pecos County game warden acquired a search warrant for a residence in Fort Stockton that was known to have a live American alligator as well as other illegally obtained live species. Unfortunately, the resident of the house had moved out a week prior to another location in town. Left at the house were two ornate box turtles and one red-eared slider which were relocated at the request of the landlord. Later in the day, the wardens were able to meet with the suspect to conduct an interview. The suspect was asked to write and sign a statement about all the animals he has had, where he got them, how he got them, and where they are now. The written statement admitted that he had possessed an American alligator and other species but had released them a week ago near the road where he collected them. The suspect consented

to a search of his new residence to prove he no longer had any other animals. Citations issued, cases pending.

--SnapTrap-- A Henderson County game warden received information from an individual who said he saw a Snapchat video of a young man shooting off the highway multiple times at night. After reviewing the video, the warden was able to obtain the shooter's name and location. Game wardens interviewed the individual who said that he was shooting at some pigs crossing the road and didn't know that the passenger was recording him with her phone. He was unaware it was going to be posted to social media. Cases pending. --Premature Celebration-- In Nov., a Red River County game warden was assisting a landowner in the evening when he heard what he believed to be duck hunters shooting well past legal hours. After relocating and talking to multiple deer hunters, the warden was able to locate a group of duck hunters celebrating their recent kill nearly 45 minutes after legal shooting hours. The five duck hunters killed a total of 21 ducks. Multiple citations were issued for hunting ducks after legal shooting hours and various other violations. Cases and civil restitution pending.
