There are many options when choosing a roofing company. Here are seven things to consider when choosing yours:

References – References go hand in 1. hand with experience and how long a company has been in business. Check a company's online profile and website. Check out online reviews. Will the company be around in a year or five years if you have a problem?

When you do this, the manufacturer should warranty your roof if installed correctly.

Written estimate – This one is simple. 4. Get your estimate in writing. Your estimate needs to list the tasks to be completed. It needs to be descriptive. If you do not understand it, ask questions. If it does not include things you agreed to verbally, get it in writing.

5. Don't always go with the lowest price – Low prices are not always the best option. Getting a roof replaced is not as simple as comparing prices at Walmart. Compare options; what kind of roofing system is being installed? Are they removing all existing old roofing material down to the wood decking? Does the contract include repairs to damaged decking? Are they replacing drip-edge? Are they installing all-new accessories like pipe jacks, ventilation, flashing, etc.?

Warranty – Does the company provide a 6. workmanship warranty? Does the company provide a manufacturer warranty?

February

"A new year has turned the corner and ,as usual, Mother Nature has been her normal schizo self. We have recently been engulfed with mild weather stretches only to succumb to single digit temps wreaking severe havoc. I can only imagine what these bass are thinking. "Don't bother me" comes to mind! Nonetheless, with Fork holding around five feet low these big green fish still have to eat. With surface temps much warmer than a year ago this date monsta bass have to be thinking it's time to "Get Down on It". That opportunity to intersect with a ShareLunker

could very well happen shallow on a sunny day.

With all this being said, local guides are your best avenue to discover the current strategies that will land the trophy you've long dreamt of. On the clear sunny days you need to head to the backs of the creeks and pursue the shallow bite particularly in the afternoon. Shallow water will absorb the suns rays more quickly causing the bass to move up for the warmth. By the same token, this same water cools more quickly when a major front slides through. Bass will move back out until the high pressure dissipates. While this transition is taking place the deep bite will be in vogue. Staging bass will hold on points and areas just outside of their spawning grounds. The key depth e should be focused in the 12-15ft area. Big bass stage at key junctures at the mouths of pockets and play a waiting game with the water temps suit their liking. This is when you bring out the guns to usher in the trophy bass. The A-rig will be go to strategy and it's set up is all important to the hy success. Everyone has their favorite way to rig e umbrella monstrosities but common sense will you down the right path based upon the "where" will be throwing it. Naturally, if you are in open er with no timber, the best rig would be to use a



3/16 ounce swimbait head and cover them with any five inch swimbait. As for colors, start with white and adjust from there. I found last year that dark colored baits worked better on a day to day basis. Arkansas Shiner, Dirty Sanchez and Houdini all performed well when using the Reaction Innovation Skinny Dippers. I will go as far to say that we had some great days using the Little Dippers instead of the five inch versions. It all comes down to what the fish want. Option two is to rig the A-rig with weedless swimbaits using belly weighted hooks. This will keep you out of trouble when casting into timber. Once rigged, I



to timber. Once rigged, I use 25lb P-line on a 5:1 gear ratio reel all loaded on a 7'11" rod. This is a great launching pad for this heavy rig and it allows you to hurl it quite a ways. Once you make the cast, let it sink to the bottom, then retrieve it slowly back to the boat. A large bass will literally knock the rod out of your hands. It's a must do pattern in February.

Big swimbaits will also play a huge roll this month, especially the expensive jointed baits. Swim or twitch them slowing in shallow water during the afternoons and hold on to your business. Strikes can be vicious. Other options to target bass would include using jigs, black/blue, in the creek bends towards the back of most all major creek arms. They

along with a "Mr. Crappie" fishing line in 2010. Marshall partnered with Strike King the following year to design a wide variety of specialized crappie lures under the "Mr. Crappie by Strike King" brand. As a result, "Mr. Crappie" is one of the most recognized and popular brands in the country.

In 2004, Marshall created the "Mr. Crappie Big Crappie Classic Tournament" with adult and youth divisions to encourage families to spend time together on the water. Marshall had a vision to create a show like the Bassmaster Classic for the crappie industry. Four years ago, the vision became a reality with the inception of the "Crappie Expo." It consists of the "Mr. Crappie" \$300,000 Invitational Tournament, the world's largest crappie fry and a three-day consumer show featuring over 100 exhibitors, including lure and tackle companies, boat manufacturers and tackle dealers.

Marshall has garnered numerous honors and awards throughout his career:

In addition to his professional accomplishments, Marshall is committed to introducing kids to the sport of crappie fishing. He has donated numerous fishing trips to youth organizations over the years and took youth fishing from the Buckner's Children's Home in Dallas.

Marshall has donated thousands of dollars of "Mr. Crappie" rods, reels and lures to youth organizations, schools, churches and the Boy Scouts. He was involved with the Garland Police Departments' Mad Dog Fishing tournament that raises money for fallen officers' families. He also donates products and his time to police and fire department functions and fundraisers.

"When I was approached to be nominated, it was a surprise and an honor," said Marshall. "I look at the

years gone by and all the things I've been blessed to do in Texas and abroad. I think about all the people I have met who helped me get to where I am at today as the 2023 inductee. You don't really know how many people you actually touch through your work and I'm grateful that I get to represent Texas in the Hall of Fame. My motto in life and in business is "Whatever It Takes To Get It Done." I wasn't looking for success but I worked hard at it — the reward is having the honor to be included in the Hall of Fame with my peers."

The Texas Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame is housed at the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center in Athens. Its mission is to "recognize and honor those who have made a lasting contribution to freshwater fishing in Texas, and to foster a sense of appreciation, awareness and participation in the sport of fishing." Since 1997, the Hall of Fame has inducted 37 individuals and organizations, including Gary Klein in 2022. Marshall will be inducted as the 38th member during a ceremony at the Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center on Oct. 6.

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



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

Report all unusual mass (TPWD) received test results recently confirming diagnoses of Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease virus 2 (RHDV2) in two desert cottontail rabbits and one black-tailed jackrabbit in El Paso County. This marks the first confirmed cases of RHDV2 in wild rabbits in Texas this winter.

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHD) is a highly contagious viral disease that can affect both domestic and wild rabbit species, including hares, jackrabbits and cottontails. This disease is nearly always fatal and primarily affects adult rabbits. The viral agent, Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV), is a calicivirus with two strains, RHDV1 and RHDV2, both reported in North America in recent years. RHDV appears only to affect rabbit species (lagomorphs). It is not known to affect humans, livestock or pets other than rabbits. However, pets should not be allowed to consume dead animal carcasses.

TPWD has confirmed RHDV2 in several West Texas counties in recent years. If sick or dead wild rabbits are noticed, a local TPWD wildlife biologist should be contact-

bits on the RHD page of the TPWD website. Often, the only clinical sign of the disease is sudden death. In less acute cases, rabbits display dullness/apathy, not eating, bleeding from the nose and eyes or watery, congested eyes. Some may also exhibit neurological signs such as incoordination, excitement or seizure-like episodes.

This highly contagious disease spreads between rabbits through contact with infected rabbits or carcasses, their meat or their fur, contaminated food or water, or materials encountering them. RHDV2 can persist in the environment for a very long time. These factors make disease control efforts extremely challenging once it occurs in wild rabbit populations.

Domestic rabbit owners who have questions about RHDV2 or observe sudden death in their rabbits should contact their private veterinarian. Private veterinarians are requested to contact the USDA-APHIS or the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) to report any suspected cases at 1-800-550-8242. Rabbit owners or breeders should practice biosecurity on their farms




In addition to the largemouth bass license plate, the Texas rivers plate raises an average of \$40,000 per year for inland fisheries conservation, recreation and management projects. Launched in 2017, funds from the Texas rivers plate are used to support projects that promote paddling and fishing access, invasive species control and fish habitat enhancement in Texas' rivers and streams. Recent projects include rock installation at the Bosque River paddling trail access point below Lake Waco and at the Barrett Road access site above the lake to improve the parking areas and kayak launches.

Funds from the Texas rivers license plate have also been used to purchase plant materials, seed or geotextile fabric for stream bank conservation projects on the Llano, Brazos and Colorado rivers. Rivers plate funding has also supported the Inland Fisheries Division's River Access and Conservation Areas Program, which leases private land along

paddling. The program is currently supporting 21 public river access areas on nine different rivers.

"The bass and Texas rivers conservation license plates look great on any vehicle," said John Botros, the Inland Fisheries Division's river access coordinator. "When I see one on the road, I know that there is a person who contributes to improving Texas' fishing and paddling resources. It is always fun to see others who help us make life better outside." Since its debut 22 years ago, the Conservation License Plate program has generated more than \$11 million. In addition to the largemouth bass and Texas rivers plates, other plates in the collection include horned lizard, rattlesnake, monarch butterfly and hummingbird plates benefiting wildlife diversity, white-tailed deer and bighorn sheep plates benefiting big game management, camping and bluebonnet plates benefiting state parks and a roadrunner plate benefitting nature tourism and habitat conservation. To buy the largemouth bass or Texas rivers plates or one of the other available designs,

### **Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission Awards \$9.8 Million in Local Park Grants**

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission program, visit the TPWD local park grants page. fly garden and native landscaping. approved more than \$9.8 million in local park grants to help create and enhance outdoor recreational opportunities.

The competitive grants are allocated to local government entities on a 50/50 reimbursement match basis. Once funded, the sites must remain parkland in perpetuity, properly maintained and open to the public. Twenty community parks statewide will gain nature trails, native gardens, playgrounds, splash pads, dog parks and sports fields. \* Non-Urban Outdoor Recreation Grants fund park projects in municipalities under 500,000. The commission approved awards to projects in 10 communities.

\* Small Community Recreation Grants serve towns of less than 20,000 and were awarded to nine communities.





are all lined with timber and will harbor toad stature heavy rod and for small swimbaits my go to is a MH green fish. The final option as mentioned above deals with the shallow water bite. Take time to locate submerged vegetation and this will be the key to success in the late afternoons. As the water warms, dig out a rattletrap and cover some water around this vegetation. Chatterbaits will also work in these same areas and traps need to be red or gold with the chatterbait dressed in white. Using the right equipment is critical at this time of the year. I use the Okuma Scott Martin and EVX Carbon rods to get the job done. For giant swimbaits use an extra heavy rod, chatterbaits I use a



rod. For traps and small squarebills I use a medium rod which offer more bite forgiveness. I don't get too crazy with reel gear ratios as I mostly use 6:3 to 1 selections.

February is also a great month to catch numbers on the power plant lakes. You can destroy them on the hot water impoundments and catch 30-50 fish per day up to the eight pound mark. If cabin fever has set Clancy Sneed with in, give me a call and we can wear them out where the water temps are summer like. If you are headed out to Lake Fork in February searching for the trophy of a lifetime, I would love to be a part of this trophy quest. 





# Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

--Premature Celebration--A Red River County game warden was assisting a landowner in the evening when he heard what he believed to be duck hunters shooting well past legal hours. After relocating and talking to multiple deer hunters, the warden was able to locate a group of duck hunters celebrating their recent kill nearly 45 minutes after legal shooting hours. The five duck hunters killed a total of 21 ducks. Multiple citations were issued for hunting ducks after legal shooting hours and various other violations. Cases and civil restitution pending.

--Poaching on the Job--A Bexar County game warden received an Operation Game Thief complaint about a deer killed in San Antonio City limits and immediately went to pick up the poached deer. The next day game wardens made contact with construction workers that were working at the housing development where the deer was killed. After interviewing one of the subjects, he said that he had killed a deer in Devine.

After more questioning he confessed that he did indeed shoot two deer in the housing development construction property. The landowner was notified, and the workers are no longer allowed on the property and charges are pending.

--Dazed and Confused-- Two Montgomery County game wardens approached a man parked by a local boat ramp when they noticed the odor of marijuana coming from his vehicle. He admitted to possessing the marijuana and was arrested while protesting, "I thought this was Harris County!" After being told he was *(Continued on Page 24)*



Montgomery County Jail. Case pending.

--Familiar Faces--A Titus County game warden caught three men fishing on Lake Welsh without fishing licenses. One of the subjects gave a false name and date of birth, refusing to cooperate in providing his identity and even requested an ambulance because he was so upset. After the ambulance arrived, he refused transport and gave the EMT's a different date of birth when he signed the refusal for transport. The man was arrested and transported to the Titus County Jail for failure to identify and no fishing license. At the jail, his real name and date of birth was located and found to have been previously issued a citation in 2009 by the same warden for no fishing license. Citations were issued to the man for no fishing license and for failure to identify, and he was released.

--Fishing for Trouble-- Several Bexar County game wardens were patrolling Calaveras Lake when they stopped an unregistered vessel. The operator said he was only test driving the boat, but later revealed he was fishing and had purchased a one-day fishing license. After a short investigation, it was discovered that he was wanted for felony warrants by the Bexar County Sheriff's Office. The operator was arrested, transported, and booked into the Bexar County Jail. --Be One With the Tree-- A Bexar County game warden was patrolling the property around Ca-

in Montgomery County, he was transported to the laveras Lake where access is restricted when two subjects were caught trespassing on powerplant property. When the warden identified himself as law enforcement, the pair fled into the brush. One surrendered and came back to the roadway, so they were cited and released. The other could not be located because of the thickness of the brush. The warden called for backup and a second Bexar County game warden came to assist in the search for the other trespasser. The wardens searched the brush for about an hour and found the subject hiding behind a mesquite tree waiting for a vehicle to pick him up. The man was arrested for criminal trespass and evading arrest or detention, and booked into the Bexar County Jail.

> --Creeping on Critters--Two game wardens were conducting night patrols in Kimble County where several reports of possible night road hunting had been occurring. The wardens had been sitting in their location for about 10 minutes when they heard the first of multiple gunshots and saw a group


of people spotlighting. With the use of night vision goggles, the wardens located the individuals and made contact with them. The 11 individuals had permission to be on the property they were hunting on, but all were from out of state and did not possess a valid Texas hunting license. The individuals had shot several jack rabbits, raccoons and other non-game animals. The wardens issued 11 citations for hunting non-game animals without a valid Texas hunting license.

--Axis Denied-- An Edwards County game warden and a Real County game warden had been investigating an individual for several weeks for hunting from a public roadway. One day, a landowner called in a suspicious vehicle driving very slowly so the Edwards County game warden responded to the call from several miles away. While in-route he received a second call saying the individuals were seen taking an axis deer from the public road. The individuals were apprehended and confessed. Mul-

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tiple charges have been filed and cases are pending. --Oh, Crap(pie)--Two Travis County game wardens were patrolling Decker Lake when they encountered two different groups of men fishing with cast nets from boats and jet skis. Upon further investigation, the game wardens found both groups in possession of multiple game fish including bass and crappie. The wardens took possession of the fish and donated them to a family on the shore. Multiple citations and civil restitution are pending. --Shrimpin' Ain't Easy-- A Calhoun County game warden was patrolling Matagorda Bay in the early morning hours when he saw numerous commercial shrimp boats traveling into the bay. The warden observed them for a while when he saw the boats turn their navigation and deck lights off. With the use of night vision, the warden determined that the boats had dropped their nets in the water and begun shrimping. Two commercial shrimp boat captains were issued citations for shrimping at night and all resources were returned to Matagorda Bay. --Lost and Found--Two Angelina County game wardens responded to a call about a lost hunter in Angelina National Forest. Upon arrival at the scene, the wardens found out the man had been missing for several hours and was a diabetic. Temperatures were dropping because of an approaching cold front so the wardens called UAV operators from TPWD's

Wildlife Division and a Tyler County game warden, and a TPWD K-9 handler for assistance as part of a joint operation with U.S. Forest Service rangers, Jasper County EMS, a Texas Department of Public Safety helicopter and fire department volunteers. After searching for several hours, the wardens received a GPS coordinate of the missing man and they were able to locate him in the woods. He was in a pre-hypothermic state when he was found and was treated by EMS.

--When Will You Learn?--Two Polk County game wardens were on night patrol with their deer decoy "Corby" when Corby caught someone's eye. A truck passed the decoy, slowed to a stop, then quickly reversed and the headlights were positioned onto the decoy. After a brief pause, the sound of a small caliber rifle shot was heard from the vehicle. The wardens approached the subject and they were apprehended without incident. A .22 caliber rifle was found in the back seat of the truck with a spent casing still in the ejection port of the rifle. The subject also admitted to being charged for spotlighting on a public roadway near the same area a few weeks prior to this incident by a different Polk County game warden. The subject was charged with hunting white-tailed deer at night, hunting white-tailed deer using artificial light and multiple Class C citations and warnings. Cases pending.

--Liar Liar Deer on Fire-- An Upshur County game warden received a call about two deer carcasses dumped along a shared fence line with a neighbor. The caller said the two carcasses had not been quartered and only some of the meat had been taken off of the two deer. The warden called for additional back up from another warden and when they arrived at the property, the two deer were no longer on the fence line. The wardens interviewed the property owner, but he denied knowledge of the two deer. After a quick investigation, it was determined that a nine-point buck was harvested that morning by his juvenile son. When asked about the carcass, the landowner said they had taken the carcass to a creek a mile away to dispose of it. When questioned about the second deer, the landowner continued to deny claims of there being another deer. After further questioning, the landowner confessed to not harvesting all of the meat from the nine-point buck that morning and showed the wardens to a burn pile on the property where they found the wasted buck with its two front shoulders intact and on fire. The landowner continued to deny there had been another deer until one of the wardens found a partially quartered doe hidden in the high brush. The landowner then confessed. Multiple cases pending.
