Bubba does tend to get into a dither whenever he is about to fish a tournament. His behavior before the event can only be compared to a child's before Christmas morning anticipating their first new bicycle.

Bubbette misses him when he is out of town fishing tournaments but the one thing she doesn't miss are the preparations he goes through to prepare himself. This is the time when the game room in their home takes on the look of a 1/2 off sale at a major fishing tackle store.

Bubba will take everything out of his boat just so he will only take what is essential for the "Rip a Lip" event. He'll have a stack of plastics, all different shapes, sizes, and colors covering the top of their pool table. Spinnerbaits, buzzbaits, different colored skirts, trailer hooks, and changeable blades will fill the sofa. (Sometimes he will pull out the hide-a-bed so he will have even more room).

The bar in the game room is reserved for Bubba's crankbaits. This space is never large enough for his assortment of the necessary array of deadly baits the bass just can't resist, so usually there is a folding picnic table replacing the stools to allow for enough space. This accumulation of "Bubba's Stuff" could fill a long row at Bass Pro Shop. He will have his lipless baits such as Rattlin' Rapalas and Rattle Traps all lined up in assorted weights, colors and sizes all in a neat little row. Then

he'll take and line up all his diving baits. All categorized to just the essentials needed so he'll have more room in (according to him) in color, diving depths, and weight.

Once all the tackle has completely taken all available space in the game room, then it is time to break out the rods and reels. His scrutiny of these would put a safety inspector at NASA to shame. He'll check the gears, the bearings, the seating, and all working components. When this is completed to his satisfaction then it is time for the line. This in itself is quite an ordeal. On each of the multitude of rod n' reels he has to have just the right pound test and just the right colored line for the water to be fished.

After this two-day process has been completed, he is then ready to downsize and take just what will be important for the tournament. At this stage of preparation it is Bubba jumping from one piece of furniture to another picking out baits he can't float his boat without.

Bubbette really finds this stage of preparation the most humorous. She takes a ringside seat to watch Bubba slip into his "in a dither mode". She just loves it when he starts talking to his baits and mumbling his expectations of them all in the upcoming event. He'll make comments at each stop. These comments will range from, "Oh, I've got to have that," or "That one is sure enough a killer," or "Can't go anywhere without that pack!" Having seen this comedy sketch many times before she knows exactly what the outcome will be.

Well, it never fails! When Bubba has finally downsized

his boat, everything is back in the boat! Not one bait, lure, or hook is left behind. "Heck, that might be the one that catches the winning fish," Bubba will say. Then comes packing for the trip. A survivalist attempt-

ing a track through the Amazon could learn much from Bubba. He takes coffee pot, coffee, filters, ointments, lotions, lots of extra clothes and caps, (he has to look the part), food, food, and more food, and a first aid kit in case he gets a scratch and Bubbette isn't there to kiss it and make it better. After this he is ready. He has to be, there isn't room for anything else except his fishing partner and he is only allowed one tackle bag and one rod n' reel.

With all preparations completed at last it is time to get some rest. Bubba really presses his luck with Bubbette here because he wants all televisions off at 9 P.M. Bubbette is amazed how he'll always set the alarm an hour earlier than necessary and always wakes before it goes off. She'd like to know how to get him to do this on a workday without hitting the snooze control four or five times.

Bubba also has a system for determining how good a day of fishing he is going to have. If he backlashes the toilet paper first thing in the morning, he knows its not going to be a good day. If the toothpaste slips out of his hand, he's going to lose a big one, and if Bubbette doesn't tell him to be sure and put the plug in the boat... need I say more!!

#### "Much Will Change as We Coast into June!"

#### By David Ozio

"Quite a different scenario this year compared to this time last year. Fork is almost pool level and the surface temps are substantially lower as of this writing. Much of this will change as we coast into June and I suspect the lake will be at full pool before we know it. We are coming off a very unusual spring in which fish in general have been quite hard to find. The bulk of numbers that we have had through April were mostly bed fish. I also saw the moving bait bite to be insanely tough heading into the summer action. Big bass have finally started to move deep and I sus-

pect June will see them grouped up. Seriously looking forward to that! It's time to sharpen your skills with the electronics because these graphs will be the key to locating these roaming big fish pods.

Understanding what you see on your electronics is critical and I take for granted that everyone already has the ability to read these high tech graphs. If not, there are several skilled gentlemen around Lake Fork who can open your eyes to what these amazing machines can do for you. The next skill would be to determine where to look and how to recognize the bass that will start to gang up on certain types of structure. As stated earlier, humps and ridges are excellent but you can start with long tapering points. The next chore will be to ascertain what depth range where the green critters will set up shop. Start your scan in 35ft and graph your way into the 15ft range and then reverse course and head back to the starting point using a different track. Repeat this process until you have covered the entire point from front to back. If you see a group of arches on the screen during any one pass, set a waypoint on that location and put out a marker buoy on that spot once you have combed the entire area. During this time of the year, most fish will be on the bottom so you can fo-



cus your fish catching strategies on the Carolina rig, drop shot, Texas rig, jigs or crankbait. Flukes, brush hogs or any straight or curl tail worm will work using standard colors such as watermelon candy, redbug, plum or watermelon red. As for cranking, shad colored crankbaits along with chartreuse blue back also works well.

Next, let's venture out to the offshore humps or ridges. Graph these locations back and forth until you spot the likely targets. Drop a waypoint on the fishy looking spot and fish each technique until you determine what presentation they favor. If your after

a lunker of a lifetime, the jig with matching trailer will be your "go to" bait. To round out your search, target roadbeds and submerged structures such as brush piles or laydown timber. If the arches show up on your graph, pitch out a marker buoy and go to work. It's not rocket science, it's just locating where the fish are positioned. If all of this is somewhat confusing, your best bet will be to hire a full time Lake Fork guide and spend the day covering the aforementioned areas and have him point out what you need to be fishing. Bass move from day to day and they may be set up in one spot today and a hundred yards away tomorrow. Water temps, current from waves and sun angle all

#### **TPWD** Provides Anglers with Best Practices for Catch and Release of Alligator Gar

Alligator gar hold a special place in Texans' hearts as the largest and longest-living freshwater species in the state. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) works to ensure healthy populations remain in Texas for future generations to enjoy. As waters warm and alligator gar fishing heats up this summer, TPWD is working with anglers, who play a key role in conservation efforts through proper catch-andrelease practices.

"Catch-and-release fishing for alligator gar has become quite popular and data from a current evaluation in progress indicates high survival rates for released fish," said Dan Daugherty, TPWD Inland Fisheries senior scientist. "We've even recorded some fish being caught and released three or four times over multiple years."

TPWD biologists have put together some best practices for anglers to follow when they head out to the water in search of these massive fish. Alligator gar can grow up to eight feet long and weigh more than 300 pounds. The best available science suggests gar anglers follow these key guidelines to maximize survival:

1. Use non-stainless-steel tackle and hooks no age is often caused by attempting to remove a larger than 3/0.

styles no larger than 3/0 when fishing for alligator gar. Larger hooks are more likely to result in damage to internal organs, particularly for smaller fish. Stainless steel hooks and leaders have been shown to persist in fish for years, while bronze hooks and leaders degrade relatively quickly.

2. Land large fish on shore rather than on a boat.

Whenever possible, landing the fish on shore is a better practice than lifting the fish over the gunnel and onto a boat deck. The use of lassos or snares to lift a fish over a boat gunnel may result in internal injury to a heavy fish like alligator gar. If possible, keep the fish in or near the water; fully support the weight of the fish when taking photos before release. Minimize handling time.

3. Cut the line or leader on deeply hooked fish. Hooks lodged beyond the mouth cavity (in the throat, gullet or stomach) should not be removed - most studies suggest additional dam-

deep hook. Long-term survival is more likely TPWD recommends the use of single hook if the line or leader is cut and the hook left in place. Non-stainless-steel hooks degrade relatively quickly and can be more easily shed by a gar.





# "The Moon Report"

Ahhh – June fishing on Fork – it's one of my favorite months to fish! June can produce 'BIG' fish in all species. It's so exciting when we are surprised by a huge bream, a big bass, or a hard fighting white bass, or catfish while crappie fishing!

The majority of the crappie are "post spawn" and have moved out to structure in 10 to 30 ft. depths. You might find a few late spawners shallower around the new and full moon this month.

The crappie are showing up around bridges, standing timber, in creek channels, and brush piles. Don't be afraid to change up your presentation. Some days they want the bait moving, and other days they want it dead still. It's sure fun to watch the reaction of the fish on Live Scope! Those crappie don't always "SLAM" the baits - so, you need to be vigilant in watching your line because the sneaky ones will push your bait up and your line will go slack. If your not watching, you'll probably miss that fish.

Also, the color jig they prefer can change daily, so keep a good assortment on hand. Right now I am using an assortment of "Limits Tackle, Skipper Jigs, and Bonehead Stump Bugs. The colors pro-



ducing now have been white/and chartreuse, grey/black, electric chicken, and L.S.U. These are all available at Lake Fork Marina along with all your crappie fishing needs.

Another reason I love June fishing on Fork is it's time for some bream action! They are showing up in brush piles and around bridge ledges. But, around new and the full moon, they will be in 1-5 ft. on slip bobbers. Others will back off in that 5-15 ft. and I will tightline with night crawlers or crickets just off the bottom. Hang on tight because you never know what you might catch while fishing for these bream! I'm sure looking forward to the next full moon!

It's great to be back after a few weeks in Missouri. Our lake level is finally back to normal and looking beautiful! The fish are biting and it feels so good to be back in my "Luxury Liner" – (my Skeeter Solera). A 'BIG' thank you Skeeter for creating such a comfortable boat for us crappie fishermen!

Hey don't forget – the second weekend in June is the incredible "Skeeter Boat Owners Tournament" at Lake Fork Marina, so come out to watch the hourly weigh-ins and check out all the vendors. They put on an amazing event.





(TPWD) has designated Hords Creek Lake in Coleman County as "infested" with invasive zebra mussels, signifying that an established, reproducing population is present in the lake.

Staff with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers initially found a single zebra mussel attached to dam infrastructure in April. TPWD biologists followed up with shoreline and substrate surveys and discovered the presence of multiple size classes of zebra mussels. The survey results indicate the presence of a reproducing population in the waterbody.

Zebra mussels began spreading westward in Texas when lakes O.H. Ivie and Brownwood

TPWD urges boaters to follow these three "Unfortunately, zebra mussels have now spread simple but crucial steps to clean, drain and dry boats and gear before traveling from lake to lake. Remove plants, mud and debris. Drain all water from the boat and gear. Once back home, open compartments and allow everything to dry completely for at least a week, if possible.

> If a boat has been stored in the water at a lake with invasive mussels, it is likely infested and poses an extremely high risk for transporting these invasive species to a new lake. Before moving the boat, call TPWD at (512) 389-4848 for guidance.

> In addition to the harm invasive species can cause to aquatic ecosystems, water infrastructure and the recreational experience at lakes, the transport of these organisms can result in legal trouble for boaters. Transporting prohibited aquatic invasive species in Texas is illegal and punishable with a fine of up to \$500 per violation. It's also the law that boaters must drain all water from

#### **Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Awards \$5.14 Million in Recreational Trail Grants to Texas Communities**

During a recent meeting, the Texas Parks able for re-allocation this year. and Wildlife Commission approved more than \$5.14 million dollars in grants funding 15 construction projects and one educational development across the state.

The National Recreational Trails Fund (NRTF) supports recreational trail construction, renovation and acquisition. The grants are funded from a portion of the federal gas tax generated by gasoline purchases for off-highway vehicles. Thirty percent of the total NRTF grants must be earmarked for motorized recreational trails, while another 30 percent must be spent on non-motorized trail projects. The remaining 40 percent is discretionary.

The Texas Legislature has added an additional \$1,000,000 per year to the program (pending passage of the state budget), which includes an additional \$1,000,000 for this year from Sporting Goods Sales Tax funds. Additionally, several projects funded in previous years were completed under budget and five projects were cancelled, creating another \$700,000 avail-






To date there are no known cases where CWD has infected a human, but recent research suggests that CWD transmission from infected animals to humans should not be ruled out. come into play when dealing with these wary creatures. Try not to over complicate it, fish what you see and let the results be your guide.

The shallow bite is also an option even in this low water condition and don't rule out top water and frog action especially around stumps and laydowns. Low light is key for success in this arena. Once the sun makes it's way up, shift gears and pitch a creature bait next to the timber and in some cases, let it soak. A 3/8 ounce weight will do the trick and use at least 20lb line. Your favorite colors will work fine, just keep it simple. The most important factor in this pro-



cess will be the accuracy of the pitch. Pick the bush apart until you key on where the bass are positioned. Once that is established, follow that pattern across the lake. It will pay off in spades. If simple action is what you seek especially if kids are involved, I would chase the sand bass. You can use a 1/2 ounce Hopkins spoon or a 1/2 ounce jig head with a fluke jr. attached. This is wicked fun on light line. We can spend a day on the water if you like and I can teach you the ropes how to catch a ton of these entertainment fish.







## Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

--Does Your Mother Know That You're Out?--Tom Green County Game Wardens patrolled a city street late at night, when a white vehicle sped by in a 40-mph zone. The warden sped up to catch the vehicle and finally paced him at 60-mph. The warden attempted to stop the vehicle, but the driver evaded. Once pursued, the suspect drove down a residential alley and crashed into a garage. The sus-

pect abandoned their vehicle and fled on foot. No one on scene was injured. Multiple agencies responded to assist with the crash and search for the suspect. During the investigation, wardens could hear the suspect's cell phone ring over and over. Once in the vehicle, they found the cell phone connected via Bluetooth. The phone continued to ring as they gathered evidence. Eventually, wardens along with their city police counterparts answered the phone. The caller identified herself as the suspect's mother. Believing the officers

were buddies of her adult child and playing a joke on her, she identified the suspect and demanded to speak with them. Wardens explained the situation and discovered that over the years, the suspect accumulated multiple felony warrants. Charges pending.

--Don't Fence Me In--Local ranch managers notified local Polk County Game Wardens that an individual, well known in the area for stirring up trouble, trespassed on their property multiple times in the past few months. The landowner turned over footage *(Continued on Page 24)*

Garlic and Oregano Marinated Grilled Chicken (Makes 8 servings)

#### Marinade

In a blender, combine the vinegar, lemon juice, lime juice, honey, ancho chile powder, garlic and oregano and blend 30 seconds. With the motor running, slowly add the olive oil until emulsified. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Makes about 3 cups.

Season the chicken quarters with salt and pepper to taste and marinate in the garlic and fresh oregano marinade two hours, refrigerate.

Prepare a grill. Remove the chicken quarters from the marinade and shake off any excess. Grill until done, about 10 minutes on each side, and place on a serving platter. Enjoy!!

Try this delicious "Banana Cream Pie" recipe for dessert! **Banana Cream Pie** <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup sugar 2 tablespoons corn starch 1/8 teaspoon salt 2 cups milk 4 egg yolks 1/4 cup Karo Light Corn Syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 tablespoon butter 1 to 2 medium bananas 1 prepared graham cracker pie crust Whipped cream, optional Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt thoroughly in a heavy saucepan OR top of double boiler. Cover with plastic wrap and chill several hours or overnight before serving. Top with whipped cream, if desired.

from multiple game cameras showing the suspect riding through the property on a homemade ATV. Eventually, the ranch managers caught him in the act and tried to hold him at gunpoint. They were unsuccessful and the suspect fled into the woods, leaving behind his homemade ATV. Concerned the trespasser was utilizing the unusual route to deal drugs in a neighboring subdivision, one of the wardens drove to the suspect's home. Once there, he spotted the suspect outside with two other males. The warden requested backup from a county deputy since the suspect had a track record of fleeing law enforcement. When the deputy arrived, the suspect was working on a vehicle in the yard. Together, they questioned the suspect, who stated he was unaware that he had been trespassing. The warden informed the suspect that he was trespassing because he crossed a fence as well as other barriers into a property that did not belong to him. The suspect was then arrested without incident and booked into the county jail. Case pending.

--What Happens in Vegas ...- Patrolling for wildlife violations, Harris County Game Wardens observed a flashlight beam in the woods and a truck operating erratically on an adjacent private easement road. The wardens stopped the vehicle and contacted the driver. Wearing full camouflage, the driver exited the vehicle imme-

diately with his hands up. What appeared to be a potential road hunting case quickly changed when the driver and their partner stated that they lived nearby and were investigating a prowler after an alert from their farm dogs. The wardens confirmed their house was located just 200 yards away from where the couple stopped. While interviewing the driver, a loaded revolver was located on the center console. A serial number check revealed that the pistol was stolen during a 2006 burglary in Las Vegas. The driver stated he couldn't remember if he was given the pistol or purchased it but denied any knowledge that it was stolen. With no independent charges to file or evidence that the driver was involved or had knowledge of the theft, the couple were released from the scene and the pistol was seized for return to the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.


--When Doves Cry--While patrolling late at night, a Bastrop County Game Warden heard

multiple shots from a nearby property. As he arrived, a truck exited the property, and he initiated a traffic stop. He immediately recognized the driver as a convicted felon he had previously arrested twice. The driver admitted to multiple guns in the truck and claimed they belonged to the passenger. However, the passenger could not answer basic questions on the firearms like how many or what kind they were. The warden also recovered a fish shocker in the backseat and two freshly killed mourning doves in the bed of the truck. The individuals claimed the doves had somehow fallen out of a tree and into the truck. Altogether, the warden seized seven firearms, one shocking device and two mourning doves. Dispatch confirmed one of the firearms was stolen. The male subject was arrested for unlawful possession of firearms by a felon and possessing a shocker within a half-mile from public water. The female passenger was arrested on 11 out-

--Where Everybody Knows Your Name--After assisting with a manhunt, a Falls County Game Warden was returning home when another vehicle changed lanes abruptly, almost striking his patrol vehicle. The warden initiated his emergency lights for a traffic stop but it took almost a mile for the driver to pull over to the shoulder. Upon contact, he noticed the driver was under the influence. During the standard field sobriety test, the driver asked several times if he could just be taken home or if someone could pick him up. The warden explained that the test revealed an absolute level of intoxication (three times the legal limit) and he was going to be arrested for driving while intoxicated. The driver became very emotional and sat down on the shoulder, refusing to be placed in the patrol vehicle. With the assistance of a deputy, the warden spoke with the driver for a few minutes and the driver finally agreed to get in the deputy's patrol vehicle. Once at the jail, staff immediately recognized the driver. Just the week before, the driver had been arrested and released for another driving while intoxicated charge.

--Facebook Advertising Works-- A Titus County game warden completed a joint investigation on a local wholesale fish dealer for illegally im-

porting and selling whole unprocessed alligator Disorderly Conduct by Language. All three subfrom Louisiana. This investigation was initiated when an unprocessed alligator was advertised ing from the state park, which will restrict them for sell on Facebook in Henderson County by an unlicensed retail fish dealer. The wholesale dealer in Titus County was found to have illegally imported the undocumented alligators into Texas for resale. One citation issued for No Alligator Wholesale Dealer Permit. Two warning citations were also issued for No Alligator Import Permit and two warning citations for Illegal sale of alligator.

--No Overnight Parking-- A Titus County game warden completed an investigation on three men who were illegally entering Lake Bob Sandlin State Park late at night to fish. The subjects were videotaped for months driving the wrong way down a one-way street, attempting to bypass the security cameras, and enter the park without paying. Two of these subjects had been warned numerous times by state park police and park staff, with six citations issued for Fail to Pay Entrance Fee for State Park, two citations for Parking where Prohibited - Handicapped Zone, and one citation for No Fishing License. One subject was also arrested for Fishing after License Suspended or Revoked. Warning Citations were issued to one subject for Assault by Threat and

jects were also issued a Criminal Trespass Warnfrom entering the premises for a period of one year.

--Hot to Trot-- While patrolling Cow Bayou for water safety violations, Orange County wardens encountered an untagged saltwater trotline that had been freshly set. After they picked up the trotline, one of the wardens attached his card to one of the end posts to see if the fisherman would call him. Later that afternoon in another part of the bayou, the wardens came across a vessel with two fishermen clearly tending another saltwater trotline. When asked what they were doing, one fisherman replied, "About to get a ticket, I guess." He admitted to having placed the untagged trotline, and two others, including the one the wardens picked up earlier. Also, he said that he got the card off his other marker and was going to call after he got off the water. After receiving the citations, he removed the remaining trotlines, and returned the illegally caught resources to the
